### Infection Prevention

Everyday, workers in the areas of preparedness and prevention head off to their jobs to prevent and prepare for the unknown. These positions are primed to prevent an event and prepped to deal with it should it happen. The people that hold these positions could spend a career preventing a large scale event and never see one come to fruition.



Ruth Blackwill is the Infection Prevention nurse at GCMC. Each year, Ruth deals with the outbreak of the flu and administers vaccine to the employees to combat the spread. 2020 was an exception to a regular flu year.

COVID-19 hit Gove County in early April of 2020 putting the hospital on high alert and springing infection prevention into action. With a profession like

Ruth's, it's all about prevention. But, is that profession prepared to deal with a large scale event?

Ruth has been employed with GCMC since 1996 and is a Registered Nurse. She accepted the position of Infection Prevention several years ago. In 2018, Ruth was awarded Employee of the Year which was voted on by her peers.

When COVID-19 hit Gove County, Ruth, along with Dr. Michael Machen, Dr. Scott Rempel and CEO David Caudill implemented measures to prevent the spread. These measures were then enforced by Ruth within the hospital. For the last 9 months, Ruth has worked tirelessly to try to stay ahead of the spread. This included spending more time at the hospital than with family, frustration, tears and sometimes wanting to give-up.

In late fall, COVID-19 started to spread through the Long Term Care. Before the LTC spread, Ruth stated that keeping it out of there was a top priority and hoped it could be avoided. COVID-19 had other plans. It was eventually contained in the LTC but not before it claimed many lives.

Since the onset of the virus, Ruth has been responsible for reports to the state on a daily basis, coordination of coverage for temperature screenings at the hospital entrance, and attended a multitude of meetings to continue to plan and prepare. Where some healthcare facilities fell short in preparedness, surveys from the state found GCMC to be compliant on all COVID-19 measures within the LTC. Ruth along with the GCMC COVID-19

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task force, ensured on-going state compliance amid a pandemic. Ruth has done an amazing job leading us through the prevention of spread and watching out for the safety of the residents, patients and employees.

In late December of 2020, the first doses of COVID-19 were available to healthcare employees. Ruth again led the charge to inoculate workers and to overcome misinformation about the vaccine.

With a position of infection prevention and the inability to stop a highly infectious virus, Ruth could have easily waved the white flag and succumb to the notion that we failed. However, it's the poise of the position held by Ruth that pressed forward licking wounds and preparing for the next trial. Ruth is both humble and selfless and we are proud to have her on our team. ## Be at Ease Without Disease


February is American Heart Month. Every year more than 600,000 Americans die from heart disease. This is the number one

## Respiratory Therapy Program Enhanced by New Equipment

### What is Plethysmography?



Recently, the Respiratory Therapy program at GCMC added a plethysmography box. Looking more like a phone booth or a hurricane simulator machine, the plethysmograph box is for doing complete Pulmonary Function Testing (PFT).

With the new equipment, the Respiratory Therapy program can now expand their service to include the following:

#### FVC

Forced vital capacity: the amount of air that can be forcibly exhaled from your lungs after taking the deepest breath possible.

#### SVC

Slow vital capacity: the volume of air on a slow complete exhalation after a maximal inspiration.

#### DLCO

Diffusing capacity of the lungs for carbon monoxide is a measurement to assess the ability of the lungs to transfer gas from inspired air to the bloodstream and acts as a surrogate marker of the extent of lung damage. DLCO values may

decrease due to conditions such as emphysema, interstitial lung diseases or pulmonary fibrosis.

#### FRC

Nitrogen washout is performed on patients unable to tolerate being inside the PFT box. Functional residual capacity is the volume of air left in your lungs after a normal, passive exhalation. FRC can decrease due to restrictive disease, such as pulmonary fibrosis or conditions that prevent the lungs from expanding. FRC can increase in the presence of severe airway obstruction which impairs adequate exhalation. Emphysema, cystic fibrosis and COPD can cause this.

#### Plethysmography

Measures lung volumes. It is used to help diagnose restrictive lung disease, evaluate obstructive lung diseases such as bullous emphysema and cystic fibrosis, follow the course of disease and response to treatment, measure resistance to airflow and measure response to bronchodilator medications.

#### Bronchodilator

Is a drug given that causes widening of the bronchi.

#### Post FVC

Evaluation of respiratory function after bronchodilator medications can help improve diagnosis accuracy for COPD. Such assessment can also help identify patients who have asthma or asthma-COPD overlap.

#### Post Plethysmography

Lung function testing could complement clinical findings to better define patients with asthma-COPD overlap and refine treatment for chronic obstructive lung diseases.

They work under the direction of a physician and assist in the diagnosis, treatment, and management of patients of all ages, with respiratory illnesses and other cardiopulmonary disorders and most often critically ill patients in the hospital. ♦♦♦

### Be at Ease Without Disease

In early January, employees received their first round of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine. Other employees that hadn't received the Pfizer received their first round of the Moderna vaccine.

The Long Term Care staff and residents were vaccinated in the middle of January by Walgreens. A team was sent to our Long Term Care and took care of all of the vaccinations.



It has been said that prevention is better than a cure. GCMC encourages everyone to get vaccinated when the shot is available.

As the vaccine rolled out, 21 million healthcare workers and 3 million residents and staff of nursing homes were the first to be offered it. According to the New York Times, 39 percent of deaths from COVID-19 have occurred in long term care facilities.



A formally adopted plan for distribution has been developed by the Centers for Disease Control. Following the inoculation of healthcare workers, it is left up to the states to develop their own distribution plan or follow the CDC plan.

### Walgreens Vaccinates LTC Staff and Residents

Walgreens came to vaccinate LTC staff and residents in January. The company took on the task of completing the paperwork and the administration of the vaccine. We thanked them for the assistance. In speaking with the Walgreen's staff we were told that they are making the rounds to Long Term Care facilities all around the state to assist where they can. Everyone is encouraged to get vaccinated when it is available to you.



### Scholarship Program Revitalized at GCMC



GCMC is in the process of revitalizing the scholarship fund for its employees. A scholarship fund previously in place provided funding to employees wishing to advance their education. The scholarship fund would pay for an employee's tuition while they remained an employee of GCMC. The new program will be similar to the previous one with the exception of a larger start-up balance and new sustainability measures.

The scholarship program will be funded in part by GCMC, fund raising, and grants. The scholarship program will create higher educated employees, reduce expenses, retain the population of Gove County, and recruit new people from outside of Gove County. ♦♦♦




