recognized each year, as they should be, through special nurse appreciation days, weeks, and months

This year's theme "You Make a Difference" was selected to encourage nurses, individuals, employers, other health professionals and community leaders to recognize and promote the vast contributions and positive impact of America's nurses.



We are all indebted to nurses for their unwavering commitment to patients, their communities. and our health care svstems. Celebrating and honoring nurses during the month of May provides an

added opportunity to promote the value of nursing and advocate for the profession.

The Technology Trends 5 C

n the last decade, the proliferation of Artificial Intelligence (AI) across industries took the world by storm, and the trend is likely to continue. AI's application in medicine ranges from increasing the diagnosis accuracy to disease detection.

With the COVID-19 pandemic disrupting the health care industry, radiologists encountered heavy strain as computed diagnosis became the norm. In this situation, an AI-based system removed the radiologists' burdens by optimizing the diagnosis process.

Al algorithms can perform scans, detect patterns and give diagnoses in seconds. Today, tech giants like Google and IBM have released their Al-infused technologies that help medical facilities unearth data.

The industry will actively use AI-based tools to quickly find new drugs and act on trends. Furthermore, AI chatbots are becoming popular in health care as a medium to provide help to customers through email and phone support 24/7.

Companies are combining AI with robotics to make virtual assistants for doctors and nurses. It also helps physicians provide care without going near a patient.

The transformative power of Artificial intelligence continues to reverberate across many industries. Its

impact on healthcare promises to be truly lifechanging. From hospital care to clinical research, drug development and insurance, Al

applications are revolutionizing how the health sector works to reduce spending and improve patient outcomes.

Artificial Intelligence has the potential to short-circuit the traditional methods to cut costs, improve treatment, and bolster accessibility in tandem. The key to unlocking the current healthcare system's cost-structure problem lies in transferring time-consuming human tasks to machines while

enabling patients to self-service their care needs where possible. That will reduce the amount of human labor required to keep more people healthier. Eventually, AI could help address some 20% of unmet clinical demand.
